The Cult of the South Pacific by Leslie Primo

Part 1: Cook and the Invention of Paradise - Voyages and Discoveries

This lecture will look at the artistic legacy of Cook's voyages to the South Pacific and the events that led up to the invention of paradise and the European notion of the exotic.

Charting the three voyages we will not only discover exotic objects that were brough back from the South Pacific, but

also the artists that accompanied Cook on all three voyages and who gave us a wealth of paintings and illustrations of said objects and the verdant lands.

Artists such as John Webber (1751 - 1793), Johann Reinhold Forster (1729-1798) and his son Johann Georg Adam Forster (1754-1794), Sydney Parkinson (c.1745–1771, William Parry (1743 -1791) are among those that would paint these exotic images.



Leslie Primo is a graduate with a degree in Art
History and an MA in Renaissance Studies from
Birkbeck, University College, London. During his
studies he specialised in early Medieval and
Renaissance studies, including: Italian Renaissance
Drawing; Art and Architecture in Europe 1250-1400;
Art and Architecture in Europe 1400-1500; Medici

and Patronage; Narrative Painting in the Age of Giotto; the work of Peter Paul Rubens, focusing on his paintings of the Judgement of Paris; and Greek Myth in paintings.



Part 2: Omai, the Exotic and Joshua Reynolds

This lecture will look at the events that led up to Joshua Reynolds's portrait of Omai becoming an emblematic and iconic image representing Britain at the very height of its imperial powers. To explore this famous moment from history when two worlds collided, the key players in Omai's story will be explored, including his origins in Tahiti, his background and motivation to come to England, followed by his time in England and English society and his interaction therein.



Part 3: Invention and Re-Invention - Gauguin's Portraits and the Myth of Paradise

This lecture will look at the enduring Western obsession with, and invention of, the so called 'exotic' or 'noble savage' that would eventually

manifest itself in the 19^{th} and early 20^{th} century with the images of Gauguin. And so this lecture takes us into the modern period and looks at what happens to these notions of the exotic in the 19^{th} century explored through the Impressionist and Post-Impressionist work of this period's most notable visitor to the island of Tahiti also looking for the exotic and paradise - Paul Gauguin (1848 – 1903).
