Lecture — Wednesday 14 February at 7pm AS Truro AGM followed by The Art of the Automobile by Roger Mendham Held in Mylor Theatre, Truro College



The earliest cars were purely functional and lacked even the most basic of passenger comforts, such as doors or even windscreens to protect passengers from the elements.



However, progress was rapid and by the mid-1920s we entered a golden age of automobile design. A new generation of stylish cars were influenced by the art deco movement and the 'Great Gatsby era' included some of the most famous and fabulous cars ever built.


This period was followed by the Streamline Moderne influenced

cars of the 1930s and 40s, with aerodynamic shapes and lots of chrome detailing. This talk covers some of the most beautiful cars ever built, and focuses on the work of the coachbuilders, who were inspired by the art movements and created 'mobile works of art'.

About the Lecturer

A keen and accomplished photographer Roger has gained Distinctions from the Royal Photographic Society and is currently the President of the Surrey Photographic Association.

His artistic taste is predominantly 20^{th} century and he is particularly interested in the visual aspects of art. He has studied the evolution of photography from its earliest days in the early 1800s to becoming a major art form in the late 20^{th} and now 21^{st} centuries.



An experienced public speaker, his talks are all richly illustrated with both his own and images from some of the leading photographers in history.

Lecture — Wednesday 13 March at 7pm Colourful Characters - Laura Knight's Models by Catherine Wallace

This lecture replaces the advertised lecture 'Once Upon a Time' by Jeni Fraser.

Thank you to Catherine Wallace for stepping in at late notice.

In this lecture, local art historian Catherine Wallace delves into the fascinating range of models portrayed by renowned UK figurative painter Dame Laura Knight RA (1877 – 1970) throughout her illustrious career, highlighting the vivid and diverse characters depicted. From children, to fellow artists such as Eileen Mayo and Ella Naper; stars of the ballet including Pavlova and the theatre such as John Gielgud. Laura Knight also made many studies of the circus acts during her travels with them in the 1920s and 30s. including some of the most colourful clowns. She also painted the Romany gypsies of Epsom and Ascot horse

races from young and old in all their finery. As an official War Artist in Second World War she also painted portraits of women doing men's work in the factories such as Ruby Loftus.

George William Joy's painting of the death of General Gordon in 1885, 'murdered' on the steps of the governor's palace in Khartoum by the Mahdi's 'dervishes' was ignored by critics and dismissed as inaccurate by scholars, but became one of the iconic images of the British Empire.



September 11 James Whistler

This lecture explores the paradox of Whistler whose flamboyant and eccentric ways made him both admired and detested in equal measure yet whose quiet, meditative paintings ultimately assured him a place as one of the high priests of the Aesthetic Movement.

October 9 Inspired by Stonehenge by Julian Richards

Stonehenge will be examined as a piece of prehistoric architecture before looking at it's influence on painters, potters and poets over the centuries and how it has become a cultural icon.



November 13 Dress Diary of Anne Sykes by Kate Strasdin

In 2016 Kate Strasdin was given an unusual volume. It contained over 2000 swatches of fabric



pasted into a marbled album but it had no provenance and no known background. Kate spent the next six years uncovering its secrets, discovering its author and the life that she led.

December 11 Wilde About Oscar by Simon Whitehouse

Oscar Wilde: writer, wit & the first modern celebrity. From his childhood in Ireland to his artistic circle in Chelsea and glittering West End first nights, to the criminal trial of the age, we chart Oscar's extraordinary journey and discuss his enduring appeal & legacy.

Young Arts



Volunteers



DISCOVERY DAY The Remarkable Pinwill Sisters

Wednesday 20th March 2024

The author Dr Helen Wilson whose research led to her book 'The Remarkable Pinwill Sisters', will be joining us to recount their story. At a time when running a company was deemed an exclusively male preserve, the sisters, Mary, Ethel and Violet, established a thriving business in the late 19th century into the 20th century whose output in terms of quantity and quality is only now being recognised as among the most significant in ecclesiastical woodcarving at which craft the Pinwills were sublime artists. Our own LAS team of Church Recorders met Helen whilst she was researching St Martin's Church, Looe.

VENUE: The day starts in St Martin's Community Hall, Looe (PL13 1FA). In the afternoon we move to St Martin's Church, Liskeard (PL14 3AQ)

The Truro School Art Collection on display at the Royal Cornwall Museum — 30 January - 18 May



In the early 1980s David Heseltine, then Head of Art at Truro School, found himself frustrated that the independent status of the school barred it from borrowing artworks from the Cornwall Council Schools Art Collection. He was convinced that the school should begin its own Collection in order that generations of students might learn from looking at the real thing. Today, the Collection encompasses nearly 300 artworks representing a veritable A-Z of late 20th and early 21st century artists, the majority of whom lived and worked in Cornwall and some of who attained international recognition. The Collection is rarely seen, and this is only the second time that the Collection has featured in an exhibition at the Royal Cornwall Museum in forty years. The exhibition draws from Heseltine's unique personal archive and stories he gathered when visiting the many artists who gifted to the Collection or from whom he purchased.

Iconic artworks from St Ives, West Penwith/Newlyn halls of fame, and Falmouth Art School showcase diverse subjects and media, creating a 'living' teaching resource.

The Collection is unusually well gender-balanced and alongside Patrick Heron, Terry Frost, Peter Lanyon, Bryan Pearce and Breon O'Casey you will find works by Kate Nicholson, Margot Maeckelburghe, Daphne McClure, Sandra Blow and Wilhelmina Barnes-Graham as well as discovering artists whose work you might not know so well.

Norman & Alethea Garstin -Two Impressionists in Cornwall

An Art History Lecture by Catherine Wallace

In this talk, Art historian Catherine Wallace delves into the oftenoverlooked legacy of Norman Garstin (1847-1926), an esteemed artist of the original Newlyn School. Discover Garstin's mesmerizing landscapes around Newlyn, as well as his evocative paintings capturing the essence of Belgium and Brittany, where he dedicated significant time to teaching painting courses. Wallace will discuss the influence Norman Garstin imparted on his daughter, Alethea Garstin (1894-1978), who, inspired by renowned Newlyn painters such as Dod Procter, emerged as a prominent impressionist in the United Kingdom from the 1940s to the 1960s.

A Short History of Plaza Cinema, Truro



Halfway up Lemon Street in Truro is the art deco inspired Plaza Cinema, built in 1936 as a purpose built cinema. When it first opened it had one screen, stalls and a balcony and seats to accommodate 1,176 people. Above the entrance there were 3 dressing rooms, a café and a ballroom.

The Plaza was taken over by the Rank Organisation in 1976/77 who applied for a bingo license which was refused. An offer to purchase the cinema by the Cornwall based WTW Group was turned down in March 1977, the building eventually being acquired by a Somerset businessman who added a second screen in the cafe area seating 175.

The cinema hit hard times in the 1990s with attendances dwindling, and entered receivership in November 1996. It was subsequently closed on safety grounds by Carrick District Council, leaving Cornwall's only city without a cinema.

20 years after they had unsuccessfully opened negotiations to purchase The Plaza, WTW Cinemas acquired the freehold of the premises in May 1997 and immediately began an extensive reconstruction and refurbishment of the building. The modernisation programme enabled The Plaza to reopen on 10th July 1998 with 4 cinemas.

Well known film critic Mark Kermode has shown great support for the Plaza over years. One reason is that the Plaza has retained the ability to show 35mm films (rather than solely digital) of which Mark is an advocate. In recent years he has hosted evenings showing such science fiction classics as 2001-A Space Odyssey, Silent Running, and Moon.

Calligrapher Required by Truro Cathedral

This is to enter names in the Books of Remembrance.

There are two Books; the main roll of folk who have died and the other is Remember our Child—for those who have lost a child. It is simply adding the names to the appropriate page on the date of death.

The Books are kept in a glass cabinet in the Chapel of Unity & Peace and the pages turned every day for all to see.



Those whose names appear on any particular day are prayed for at the morning Eucharist.

The next meeting will be Wednesday 6th March, from 2 – 4pm.



Early Medieval Cornwall - Life at the Crossroads, John Fletcher Wednesday 21st February 2024, 1-2pm

About the Talk

As the Roman Empire collapsed at the beginning of the 5th century, a powerful kingdom emerged in South West Britain based on the former tribal boundaries that came before. These were the ancestors of the Cornish; and far from being alone or cut off from the world they were at



the centre of a maritime trade network that reached from the Irish Sea all the way into the Mediterranean.

John Fletcher discusses what we know about these turbulent centuries and how the Cornwall we know today can be traced directly back to this period. This talk is FREE with an RCM annual pass (£7.50 per visitor - under-18s and RCM Members are free), which can be purchased from our reception on the day. John Fletcher is a local historian and reenactor who specialises in South West Britain in the Early Medieval period. His first book, The Western Kingdom: The Birth of Cornwall, was published in 2022 and tackles the story of the Cornwall and the Cornish identity between 400 and 1100CE.

One & All

6 February - 23 March 2024

The third and final instalment to Seamas Carey's trilogy of work on Cornwall, nationalism & identity. Following the success of the *The Reason Why* podcast and the award winning live show *Help! I Think I'm A Nationalist*, comes the resulting visual companion piece, *One & All.*



Boldly referencing and subverting the iconic image of the Cornish crest (a miner and a fisherman flanking a shield), the collection of portraits (captured by photographer Steve Tanner) explores what the people of 21st century Cornwall look like now.

Disparate figures from different communities (many of whom Carey met during the making of his podcast) standing side by side, representing a plurality of opinions, a contrast in genders, backgrounds and beliefs. The images provoke questions around belonging, inclusivity and act as a closing moment for this significant body of work.

Alongside the photographs, we'll also be hosting the exclusive, world premiere screening of *Who's The Most Cornish Person You Know?* In this 2024 comedic documentary Carey is joined by filmmaker Neal Megaw, as they embark on a quixotic quest to find the "most Cornish person there is". The pair follow a chain reaction sequence of interviews, meet fascinating characters, hold unique & thought provoking conversations and eventually discover (in theory) the epicentre of Cornishness.

The film will be played on loop throughout opening hours. Funded by Arts Council England, FEAST, Royal Cornwall Museum and Deborah Hinton.
