Lecture — Wednesday 10 April at 7pm Held in Mylor Theatre, Truro College

Murder Most Florid by Mark Spencer

An exploration of how common plants like brambles can be used to help solve serious crimes such as murder, assault or arson.

Plants too are silent witnesses to crimes. Their presence in many crime scenes can help an investigator identify a suspect or locate a victim. Apparently mundane plants such as brambles and nettles can provide valuable insights into when a crime was committed. Fragments of leaves and seeds embedded in soil on the footwear of a suspect can place them at the scene. An understanding of landscape history and land-use helps an investigator discriminate between a clandestine burial and a mediaeval feature in a woodland. Forensic botany is not a new science, plants have played a role in solving major cases for decades, including the infamous murder of aviator Charles Lindbergh's infant son.


From the Chair

Stonehenge will be examined as a piece of prehistoric architecture before looking at it's influence on painters, potters and poets over the centuries and how it has become a cultural icon.



November 13 Dress Diary of Anne Sykes by Kate Strasdin

In 2016 Kate Strasdin was given an unusual volume. It contained over 2000 swatches of fabric



pasted into a marbled album but it had no provenance and no known background. Kate spent the next six years uncovering its secrets, discovering its author and the life that she led.

December 11 Wilde About Oscar by Simon Whitehouse

Young Arts







DISCOVER THE STORY BEHIND ELISABETH FRINK'S GREEN MAN (BLUE)



Elisabeth Frink's Green Man (blue) has links to spring and rebirth. The work also speaks, says Frink expert Annette Ratuszniak, of a key time in the artist's life

British sculptor Elisabeth Frink RA (1930–93) used the image of a head as a way to express her feelings about humanity. The impetus for her artwork was the tension between aggression and vulnerability.

This 1992 screenprint, Green Man (blue), is based on an ancient architectural motif, the Green Man, a symbol of rebirth that occurs across many cultures. Frink imbues it with a

modernity and vitality through powerful drawn marks, colour and the figure's unflinching gaze.

The screenprints for this were started at Woolland in Dorset, Frink's home. Master printer Kip Gresham, Curwen Chilford Press, took materials to Frink's studio. There she drew with graphite and dilute colour washes onto a surface from which Gresham made proofs and final prints in an edition of 70.

Why the Green Man?

Frink was diagnosed with cancer in 1991 and while undergoing treatment was given a copy of Green Man: The Archetype of Our Oneness with the Earth by William Anderson. Ideas of regeneration and rebirth gave her hope and direction for new artworks. The idea of the head as a vessel for feelings dated to her early career. In the 1950s she had made abstract animal heads, where a gaping mouth or bared teeth, a nostril or eye socket expressed a life force. These sculptures blurred the line between violence and defencelessness. This duality within a head continued in her work: brutish soldiers depicted as scarred victims; aggressors hiding behind reflective goggles; survivors of oppression portrayed with heroic dignity. Resilience of the human spirit as a theme culminated in monumental heads with an introspective, enigmatic presence.

A Labyrinth and Maze in Cornwall

Labyrinth is unicursal (one path) whereas a maze is multicursal (many paths).



Since Ariadne gave Theseus the ball of string to allow him to escape the labyrinth, these puzzles have fascinated people over time. Here in Cornwall we have two such puzzles, however a new one is being built on

Bodmin Moor called Kerdroya.

The Troytown reference is probably from the city of Troy whose walls were constructed in a complex maze-like manner to confuse any intruders. The seven rings of this labyrinth are constructed of smooth pebbles. The age of this example is unknown. It is thought to be the only example of its

kind in the UK, however, there are many examples in Norway.

A story attached to this structure that is cut on the sea shore is, that it is to protect sailors. Before going out to sea the last fisherman/sailor to board the vessel would run around the maze to tease or confuse the trolls and stop them getting on board the boat.


The Hedge Maze at

Glendurgan Gardens, Mawnan Smith, Falmouth (right). This maze, constructed in 1833 is made of a laurel hedge. It was commissioned by Alfred and Sarah Fox, the owners of Glendurgan, no doubt to amuse and entertain their 12 children as well as friends and family.

This coiling serpent-like maze stretches for three quarters of a mile from entrance to exit.




The symbol of the labyrinth has been used by Christianity to show how to take the correct path in life with meaning and fulfilment at its centre.
