Lecture — Wednesday 13 November at 7pm in Mylor Theatre, Truro College Elizabethan Stitches: Overturning our Understanding by Jacqui Carey

Unfortunately, Kate Strasden who was to have given her lecture 'Dress Diary of Anne Sykes' on November 13, is unable to make it.

This lecture replaces that.

Research from books and text-based archives tells a story about needlework from the past, but the detailed examination of surviving artefacts in museum collections has provided a new 'story' - challenging our ideas about



how embroidery was produced during this era.

This lecture looks at the process of Jacqui's object-based

detective work, and her discovery that historic stitches have been misinterpreted for over a hundred years. By taking a new approach, Jacqui looks at some of the secrets that these beautiful items have to reveal.



Jacqui Carey has been a practicing craftsperson since completing her BA(Hons) degree in Textiles at West Surrey College of Art and Design in 1985. She is renowned for her work in kumihimo, and has been instrumental in introducing this Japanese technique to the West.

In 2005, Jacqui became a QEST scholar for her work in analysing historic structures and techniques, and was awarded an MA (distinction) in the History of



Textile & Dress from the Textile Conservation Centre. Jacqui's willingness to share her expertise has seen her exhibit and teach worldwide. She is also the author of over ten books.






Stonehenge (English Heritage Red Guides) by Julian Richards



The World of Stonehenge (British Museum) by Duncan Garrow and Neil Wilkin







An epic tale of two extraordinary figures from the same valley in Yorkshire who were destined to change the world of fashion and design for all time.





A Short History of the Compton Castle

The derelict Compton Castle, paddle steamer, which lies at the southern end of Lemon Quay, is due to be broken up and removed from the site.

She does, however, have an intriguing history.

Built by Cox & Co of Falmouth in 1914 for the River Dart Steamboat Co. she was the first Dart steamer to have wide extended decks and an aft elevated deck. In 1924 she was joined on the river by a sister ship Kingswear Castle.

The Compton Castle was requisitioned during World War 2 and served as a naval ammunition carrier, still on the River Dart. She resumed her peacetime sailings in 1947 and continued until 1962.

In 1964 she was sold to Baume & Woods of Kingsbridge who restored her for use as a museum and teashop, and was later moored in Looe for four years, and then moved to its final resting place in Truro in 1984.

It's engines were removed and she served as a florists shop and was later proposed as a high class restaurant.

A total refurbishment in 2011 with a flat deck, completely enclosed with a glazed structure and operated as a coffee house for a number of years.


