National Gallery, guiding a wide variety of public and private tours. He is on the faculty of Ithaca College and also lectures for the Blue Badge Guide training course on the performing arts and English literature modules. Simon's specialisms and passions are theatre, literature, fashion and art history, but whatever the subject, Simon will weave a wonderful story from it!







Pantomime: When the Fairy's over 50 by Tyler Butterworth



In this seasonal lecture I will talk about the seemingly polished world of professional pantomime - and reveal what it's really like.

Being born into a theatrical family – my father was the Carry On actor Peter



Butterworth and my mother was the Thatcher impressionist Janet Brown – I spent my childhood Christmases watching in the wings as my father was always the panto Dame and my mother was always the Principle Boy. So let me share with you the bouquets and the brickbats. I'll look at the famous names, the greatest Dames and the old routines that we all remember, and some that it's best to forget!

And I'll talk about why this most precious of British traditions will always endure, and why, surprisingly, every actor wants to do it. This is a revealing look at professional panto, from the inside, from someone who was born into it.


About the Lecturer

Tyler Butterworth grew up in a theatrical family and spent twenty five years as an actor working extensively in film, television, theatre and radio.

Now, he produces self-guided audio walking tours to cities across Europe for private clients and exclusively supplies the audio guides for the thousands of American participants in the London New Year's Day Parade. He lives in Sussex where he walks on the South Downs and the South Coast.



Richard Lander (1804 – 1834)



Richard Lemon Lander was born 8th February 1804, his father was the inn keeper of the Fighting Cocks Inn on Green Street, renamed the Dolphin, (no longer standing but a plaque marks the site of the building). Legend has it at the age of 9 Richard walked to London.

In his early teens Richard Lander went to the West Indies, however, contracting yellow fever caused him to be sent home. When Richard Lander was employed as a servant to Hugh Clapperton (Scottish Explorer) he went on expeditions to the Cape Colony and then on to Western Africa. On his return to Britain Richard Lander's authoritative accounts of his travels in Africa were well received and he was offered the opportunity to go on an expedition to discover the source of the River Niger by the British Government. Accompanied by his younger brother John travelling by canoe and by foot encountering perils of

unimaginable natures including attacks by natives, robbery, illness and fatigue they completed their mission and followed the Niger to its delta.

Success in this adventure gave some Liverpool merchants the idea to use

this mighty river as a trade route into Central Africa.

To assist with this plan Richard Lander returned to the land of the Niger. Sadly, an ambush by hostile natives resulted in a leg injury to Richard Lander, this injury was more serious than first thought and he died aged 29 years on 6th February 1834 in Fernando Po.

Within 12 months of his death the citizens of Truro had raised sufficient money to commission a statue by the Cornish sculptor Neville Northye Burnard. The foundation stone was laid in 1835 and work completed in 1836.









Jill Randall: As Above, So Below

9th November - 23rd December

Jill Randall is a sculptor and printmaker, whose latest exhibition explores questions of conflict, destruction, and ecology at historic sites.

Randall studied at Falmouth School of Art, where influences from Cornwall's industrial past began to filter into her working practice as

a printmaker and a sculptor. Now based in Lancashire, her work focuses on post -mining landscapes and the creative and intellectual questions they pose. The exhibition forms part of the artist's ongoing project to link Cornwall with sites in Australia and Mexico, where Cornish miners were a valuable resource and where cultural links still exist thanks to mining-related migration.

Randall seeks to reveal beauty in these "obscure, overlooked and forgotten" corners of the landscape which have been abandoned after industrial use.

Camilla Dixon: Original Rebels

22nd October - 24th December

A collection of work by mixed media artist Camilla Dixon, which traces the legacy of environmental and social activism in her work back to the time of Hepworth and Heron.

Camilla Dixon is an artist, tutor, and lecturer, whose work is increasingly

connected to her environmental activism. She led an influential campaign against second-home ownership, highlighting the extent to which local people have been displaced by tourism and high rates of unoccupied properties in places like St Ives and Padstow.

Barbara Hepworth and Patrick Heron were towering figures in

20th century British art and amongst the most influential members of



the St Ives art colony in its heyday. Yet, Hepworth and Heron were true pioneers in another sense too. They both fought to protect St Ives and West Penwith from overdevelopment and misuse, recognising the importance and fragility of the coastline, moorland, and the historic fishing and mining communities which dotted the rough-hewn, windswept peninsula.
